# Thursday, April 22, Alderfer Auction of Pieces from the Boraten Collection



### From Points North: (New York, New Jersey, etc.)

Take New Jersey Turnpike South to the Pennsylvania Turnpike (Exit 6) Follow Pennsylvania Turnpike to Valley Forge, Exit 24. Keep to right lanes at toll booth and take the Valley Forge exit, which is the first right just past the toll booth. Proceed approximately one mile through two traffic lights. The entrance to the Sheraton Valley Forge (and Convention Center) will be immediately on the right.

#### From Points South:

## (Washington, DC; Baltimore, and Wilmington):

Take I-95 North to Wilmington, connect with Rt. 202 North and follow toward King of Prussia. Take Rt. 422 West to Route 23 West. At the entrance to Valley Forge National Park turn left onto No. Gulph Road. At the bottom of the hill, about 1/4 mile, turn left into Sheraton Valley Forge (and Convention Center).
