Hummel collectors: run to buy the 1990/1991 new releases with the "Goebel W. Germany" trademark. A new trademark has been designed for use only on Hummels. Pieces with the "W. Germany" mark (1979-1990) will be in limited supply and premium-priced on the sec-

ondary market. The newest mark, shown at left, includes the Crown and WG symbol first used in 1935.

Seen at the shows: a napkin ring specialist with sterling silver rings from \$100 up, plain plated rings \$50 and up, figural rings \$200 and up. We expected high prices for the figural rings, but were surprised at the suddenly popular and pricey plain sterling rings.

The average doll collector spends \$800 a year, according to Giftware News. There are over 630,000 adult doll collectors in the United States.

The most frequently counterfeited marks on pottery and porcelain seen by U.S. Customs are on flow blue, RS Prussia, Limoges, Nippon, and Meissen.

Build a collection of building blocks like Lincoln Logs, Tinkertoys, or Erector sets. An exhibition of these toys is now at the Canadian Centre for Architecture in Montreal, Canada.

Protect your house from burglars and damage with these suggestions from Chubb Insurance Company. The exterior door should be solid-core wood or metal. Locks should be dead bolt or jimmy-proof. A dead bolt should go at least one inch into the door frame. Door hinges should be on the inside of the house. 

Lajolica teasers

'Oriental" teapot and cover, probably England, last quarter 19th c., rectangular with molded coastal village scenes, spout and handle with animal heads, oval cover with ring finial. (restored), 9 1/2 in., \$440.

Teapot and cover, England, second half 19th c., molded branch handle and spout, acorn finial, (reglued at joint), yellow ground, central floral and leaf designs, 7 1/4 in., \$330.

Bidders pounced on a Minton cat and mouse teapot at Skinner's majolica auction. (See cover.) It had been expected to sell for \$5,000, but the final price roared to \$14,300. The design for the whimsical piece was attributed to Christopher Dresser, perhaps adding to the price.

None of the other figural teapots caused quite that much excitement, but they all sold well, including a Holdcroft Chinaman teapot and cover, \$1,210. Not much is known about Holdcroft, except that it was in business in Longton, England, from 1870 until the 1920s, and specialized in majolica.

Minton monkey teapot, England, 1874, modeled as monkey figure clenched about melon, his tail as handle, head as cover, impressed mark and date code, (minor chips), \$2,640.



Holdcroft Chinaman teapot, England, late 19th c., coconut-formed body with figure of Chinese boy on top, head mounted as finial, (chips and handle restored), 7 1/2 in., \$1,210.

Minton cat and mouse teapot, possibly designed by Christopher Dresser, England, 1881, teapot in shape of an iron with cat crouching over looped handle, mouse holding carrot on cover finial, molded band design of mice surrounding center of pot, turquoise ground, yellow handle, white cat, gray mice, impressed mark and date code, 7 1/2 in. h., \$14,300.

Minton Chinaman teapot, England, c.1875, modeled as seated Oriental, hair in queue to form handle, head as cover, holding face mask with spout projecting from its mouth, (spout restored), 5 1/8 in., \$1,760.
